Module Aim and Intended Learning Outcomes

Overall aim of the module

The overall module aim is to:

• Support students to apply concepts, perspectives, theories and methods in medical anthropology to public health issues.

Module Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the module a student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an analytical understanding of a range of concepts, principles and definitions used in medical and social anthropology;
- 2. Apply these concepts and principles in the analysis of particular public health issues across different contexts;
- 3. Evaluate the role of anthropological inquiry and analysis in public health arenas;
- 4. Critically evaluate, from an anthropological perspective, epidemiological, medical and public health approaches.

Indicative Syllabus

Session Content

- Key methods and theory: participant observation, ethnographic approaches and the history of anthropology;
- Illness and Cross-Cultural Ideas about health, sickness and the body;
- Anthropology and Biomedicine: disease, post-coloniality and risk;
- Anthropology and the Politics of Public Health: biopolitics and governmentality; global medical research.

Teaching and Learning Strategy

Learning is via directed self-study. A guide to studying the module is provided, together with access to a range of study resources, discussion forums and online webinar discussion sessions. Students are strongly encouraged to participate in the module-specific discussions and online webinar discussion sessions to obtain tutor support, and to make use of the LSHTM on-line library resources. Written feedback is provided on submitted assignments.

Each module block has a detailed outline for students to support them as they go through the readings and listen to lectures. In addition, reading guides are provided for more difficult texts. Students may be directed to listen to the recorded lectures; read specific papers detailed in the reading list. Students are also encouraged to access further online resources in order to expand their knowledge of a topic.

Teaching and Learning Strategy

At least two online webinar discussion sessions are anticipated during the year but this depends on student demand. Students will be expected to take part in two online webinar discussion sessions and to make active use of the discussion forums. Discussion and debate are critical to studying this module and students who are not active in these discussions often struggle with the assignment and exam.

There is a key Moodle tutor and other tutors cover specific topics during the course of the year on Moodle.

Assessment

Assessment Strategy

This module is assessed via one required assignment worth 30% of the student's mark and a summative exam of 2 hours and 15 minutes that is worth 70% of the student's mark. For the summative exam, students are advised to spend the first 15 minutes reading the instructions and questions.

Assignments for this module can be submitted only once annually, no later than 31 March and must be submitted via the online Assignment Management System.

Timed examinations for DL modules are held once a year, in June (including resits). Examinations in 2021/22 will either be taken in a student's country of residence in one of over 650 examination centres worldwide or will be held online. If the June 2022 module exam is held at a local examination centre, a local fee will be payable direct to the exam centre. This fee will be in addition to the module fee and is set by, and paid directly to, the individual examination centre. The level of local examination centre fees varies across the world and neither the University of London nor the LSHTM have any control over the fee amount. If the June 2022 module exam is held online, no additional exam entry fee will be payable. (Note that for those resitting module assessments, a fee will be payable.)

Resitting assessment

Resits will accord with the LSHTM's Resits Policy.

The Resit assessment will be the same assessment type as the first attempt (see previous table).

Resources

- A guide for each block, specifying the learning materials and guide time needed for each and a learning exercise;
- A reading list including details of both required and optional readings, which are available either as scans to download, or via the LSHTM's subscription to journals;
- A series of lectures, recorded at the LSHTM;
- A list of useful websites and other online resources.

Teaching for Disabilities and Learning Differences

The module-specific site on Moodle provides students with access to the module learning materials, including a study guide and online reading list (containing both essential and recommended readings), and additional resources including supplementary exercises and optional lecture recordings. All materials posted up on Moodle areas, including computer-based sessions, have been made accessible where possible. The LSHTM Moodle has been made accessible to the widest possible audience, using a VLE that allows for up to 300% zoom, permits navigation via keyboard and use of speech recognition software, and that allows listening through a screen reader. All students have access to "SensusAccess" software which allows conversion of files into alternative formats.
