Module Aim and Intended Learning Outcomes

Overall aim of the module

The overall module aim is to:

• Support students to apply concepts, theories and methods from medical anthropology to public health issues.

Module Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the module a student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an analytical understanding of a range of concepts, principles and definitions used in medical and social anthropology;
- 2. Apply these concepts and principles in the analysis of public health issues across different contexts;
- 3. Evaluate the role of anthropological inquiry and analysis in public health arenas;
- 4. Critically evaluate, from an anthropological perspective, epidemiological, medical and public health approaches.

Indicative Syllabus

Session Content

- Key methods and theory: participant observation, ethnographic approaches and the history of anthropology;
- Illness and Cross-Cultural Ideas about health, sickness and the body;
- Anthropology and Biomedicine: disease and post-coloniality;
- Anthropology and the Politics of Public Health: biopolitics and governmentality; global medical research.

Teaching and Learning Strategy

Learning is via directed self-study. The course is organised into learning sessions and uses Moodle books to direct learning. Each session has a recorded lecture, a set of readings and an exercise. Discussion forums are provided for each learning session and online webinar discussion sessions. Students are strongly encouraged to participate in the module-specific discussions and online webinar discussion sessions to obtain tutor support, and to make use of the LSHTM online library resources. Written feedback is provided on submitted assignments.

In addition, reading guides are provided for more difficult texts. Students may be directed to listen to the recorded lectures; read specific papers detailed in the reading list. Students are also encouraged to access further online resources in order to expand their knowledge of a topic.

At least two online webinar discussion sessions are anticipated during the year but this depends on student demand. Students will be expected to take part in two online webinar discussion sessions and to make active use of the discussion forums. Discussion and debate are critical to

studying this module and students who are not active in these discussions often struggle with the assignment.

There is a key Moodle tutor and other tutors cover specific topics during the course of the year on Moodle.

Assessment

Assessment Strategy

For students registering for the first time in 2022/2023

This module is assessed via an assessed assignment (100%) to be submitted no later than May 31st.

For students who first registered for the module prior to 2022/2023

Prior to 2022/23 students were required to complete an assignment (30%) and sit an unseen written examination (70%). If you are a continuing student (i.e. registered for the module for the first time prior to 2022/23) the module will be assessed as follows:

- If you have completed either the assignment or the exam, you will need to complete the remaining element of the summative assessment.
- If you have not completed either the assignment or the exam you may either continue with the assessment strategy in place prior to this academic year (i.e. assignment- 30% and exam 70%) **OR** complete the assessment strategy in place for students registering for the first time in 2022/23 i.e. 100% assignment.

For students registered before 2022/23, who are continuing with the assessment strategy in place when they first registered (i.e. an assignment and exam) the last opportunity to complete either component of the assessment strategy will be the 2023/24 academic year.

For students registering for PHM211 for first time in 2022/23

The 100% assessed assignments for this module can be submitted only once annually - no later than May 31st - and must be submitted via the online Assignment Management System.

For students who first registered for the PHM211 module prior to 2022/23 (and who are continuing with the assessment format in place when they first registered) The assignment should be submitted no later than 31 March and the exam will take place in June. Note: timed examinations for DL modules are held once a year, in June (including resits). Examinations in 2022/23 will either be taken in a student's country of residence in one of over 650 examination centres worldwide or will be held online. If the June 2023 module exam is held at a local examination centre, a local fee will be payable direct to the exam centre. This fee will be in addition to the module fee and is set by, and paid directly to, the individual examination centre. The level of local examination centre fees varies across the world and neither the University of London nor the LSHTM have any control over the fee amount. If the June 2023 module exam is held online, no additional exam entry fee will be payable.

Resitting assessment

Resits will accord with the LSHTM's Resits Policy.

The Resit assessment will be the same assessment type as the first attempt (see previous table).

The LSHTM Moodle has been made accessible to the widest possible audience, using a VLE that allows for up to 300% zoom, permits navigation via keyboard and use of speech recognition software, and that allows listening through a screen reader. All students have access to "SensusAccess" software which allows conversion of files into alternative formats.
