WASH & CLEAN Dissemination Event

In our last newsletter we reported on the upcoming WASH & CLEAN Study dissemination event and launch of the WASH & CLEAN Toolkit at the Indian Institute of Public Health, Ghandinhagar's (IIPHG) conference on Reducing the Burden of Preventable Infections: *Opportunities and Challenges for the 21st Century.*

The aim of the WASH & CLEAN study was to develop a range of data collection tools to perform an evaluation or 'situation analysis' of the state of maternity unit water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) and infection prevention and control (IPC). The Study findings were presented by Soapbox along with our WASH & CLEAN partners from IIPHG, BRAC in Bangladesh and Immpact, University of Aberdeen. The CD-based WASH & CLEAN Toolkit: A Guide to Data Collection & Tools was distributed to all conference attendees and a workshop held on the more novel elements of data collection. The conference was a huge success and generated great interest in the WASH & CLEAN study and the application of the toolkit.

Following the conference a further 25 toolkit CDs were distributed at a SHARE meeting in Delhi with several requests made for the online toolkit (soon to be available on the Soapbox website). The tools contained in the toolkit have already been adapted for use in Zanzibar and Zimbabwe, and we are excited to see such interest in further application to assist in the identification of maternity unit WASH and IPC needs.
