# **Module Aim and Intended Learning Outcomes**

### Overall aim of the module

The overall module aim is to:

 Support students to apply concepts, theories and methods from medical anthropology to public health issues.

#### **Module Intended Learning Outcomes**

Upon successful completion of the module a student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an analytical understanding of a range of concepts, principles and definitions used in medical and social anthropology;
- 2. Apply these concepts and principles in the analysis of public health issues across different contexts;
- 3. Evaluate the role of anthropological inquiry and analysis in public health arenas;
- 4. Critically evaluate, from an anthropological perspective, epidemiological, medical and public health approaches.

# **Indicative Syllabus**

#### **Session Content**

- Key methods and theory: participant observation, ethnographic approaches and the history of anthropology;
- Illness and Cross-Cultural Ideas about health, sickness and the body;
- Anthropology and Biomedicine: disease and post-coloniality;
- Anthropology and the Politics of Public Health: biopolitics and governmentality; global medical research.

# **Teaching and Learning**

### **Teaching and Learning Strategy**

Learning is via directed self-study. The course is organised into learning sessions and uses Moodle books to direct learning. Each session has a recorded lecture, a set of readings and an exercise. Discussion forums are provided for each learning session and online webinar discussion sessions. Students are strongly encouraged to participate in the module-specific discussions and online webinar discussion sessions to obtain tutor support, and to make use of the LSHTM on-line library resources. Written feedback is provided on submitted assignments.

This course is focused on reading and analysing texts and students are advised that to complete the course effectively, students need to read intensively over the 10 months. Many of the learning hours are spent reading, making notes from and reflecting on the relevant papers and book chapters. Support is given to students who are not familiar with

the ways in which to read ethnographic texts (a matrix with a list of questions in which to make notes and a 30-minute video providing details of how to read effectively). In addition, specific reading guides are provided for more difficult texts.

Students may also be directed to listen to the recorded lectures; read specific papers detailed in the reading list. Students are also encouraged to access further online resources in order to expand their knowledge of a topic.

At least two online webinar discussion sessions are anticipated during the year but this depends on student demand. Students will be expected to take part in two online webinar discussion sessions and to make active use of the discussion forums. Discussion and debate are critical to studying this module and students who are not active in these discussions often struggle with the assignment.

There is a key Moodle tutor and other tutors cover specific topics during the course of the year on Moodle.

#### **Assessment**

#### **Assessment Strategy**

#### For students registering for the first time in 2022/2023 or 2023/2024

This module is assessed via an assessed assignment (100%) to be submitted no later than May 31<sup>st</sup>.

#### For students who first registered for the module prior to 2022/2023

Prior to 2022/23 students were required to complete an assignment (30%) and sit an unseen written examination (70%). If you are a continuing student (i.e. registered for the module for the first time prior to 2022/23) the module will be assessed as follows:

- If you have completed either the assignment or the exam, you will need to complete the remaining element of the summative assessment.
- If you have not completed either the assignment or the exam you may either continue with the assessment strategy in place prior to this academic year (i.e. assignment- 30% and exam 70%) **OR** complete the assessment strategy in place for students registering for the first time in 2022/23 or 2023/2024 i.e. 100% assignment.

For students registered before 2022/23, who are continuing with the assessment strategy in place when they first registered (i.e. an assignment and exam) the last opportunity to complete either component of the assessment strategy will be the 2023/24 academic year.

### Formative assessment. New for 2023/24.

We provide a formative assessment for students to support their learning. The formative assessment does not contribute to student's final grade, but offers an opportunity to receive feedback from the module organisers on their analysis of key anthropological

concepts and ethnographic case studies. This is not obligatory but we strongly advise students to engage with the formative assessment as it has been created to support students to consider concepts and theories in-depth (which will enable them to score highly on the assessed assignment).

#### For students registering for PHM211 for first time in 2022/23 or 2023/2024

The summative 100% assignment for this module can be submitted only once annually, no later than **31 May** and must be submitted via the online Assignment Management System.

For students who first registered for the PHM211 module prior to 2022/23 (and who are continuing with the assessment format in place when they first registered) The 30% assignment for this module can be submitted only once annually, no later than 31 March and must be submitted via the online Assignment Management System.

Time-limited assessments for DL modules are held once a year, mostly in June (including resits).

Assessments are held in accordance with University of London's annual guidance but in 2023/24 they are likely to be held online.

Please note that a separate assessment fee may be payable in addition to the module fee. Further details will be communicated as soon as the final decisions are known.
